Events such as National Night Out (NNO) saw tremendous participation, with over 300 attendees joining in the celebration of community and safety. Looking ahead to 2025, we are excited to expand our outreach efforts, including Coffee with a Cop (tentatively planned quarterly), Family Night Out (mid-year), and another exciting National Night Out on the first Tuesday in October. We are committed to strengthening the bond between our department and the community we proudly serve.

As a law enforcement agency, we continuously strive to adapt to the evolving landscape of 21st Century Policing. We focus on reducing crime while maintaining the public's trust through accountability, fairness, and transparency. Regular evaluations of our policies—especially regarding pursuits and use of force—ensure that our actions align with the law and reflect the values of our community.

Budget

The Burkburnett City Council passed the vote to allot Burkburnett Police Department the following funds for the 2024 fiscal year:

This budget provides salaries and benefits for our officers while also providing them with state-of-the-art equipment, training, and resources. As stewards of the citizens' finances, we strive to utilize the funds to develop this agency to meet the city's needs. We send officers to training courses across the state and surrounding areas to bring back usable knowledge to better serve our citizens.





Statistical Analysis

The Burkburnett Police Department responded to 11,934 calls for service in 2024. This averages 32.7 calls for service a day. Of those calls, 352 Incident reports were generated.

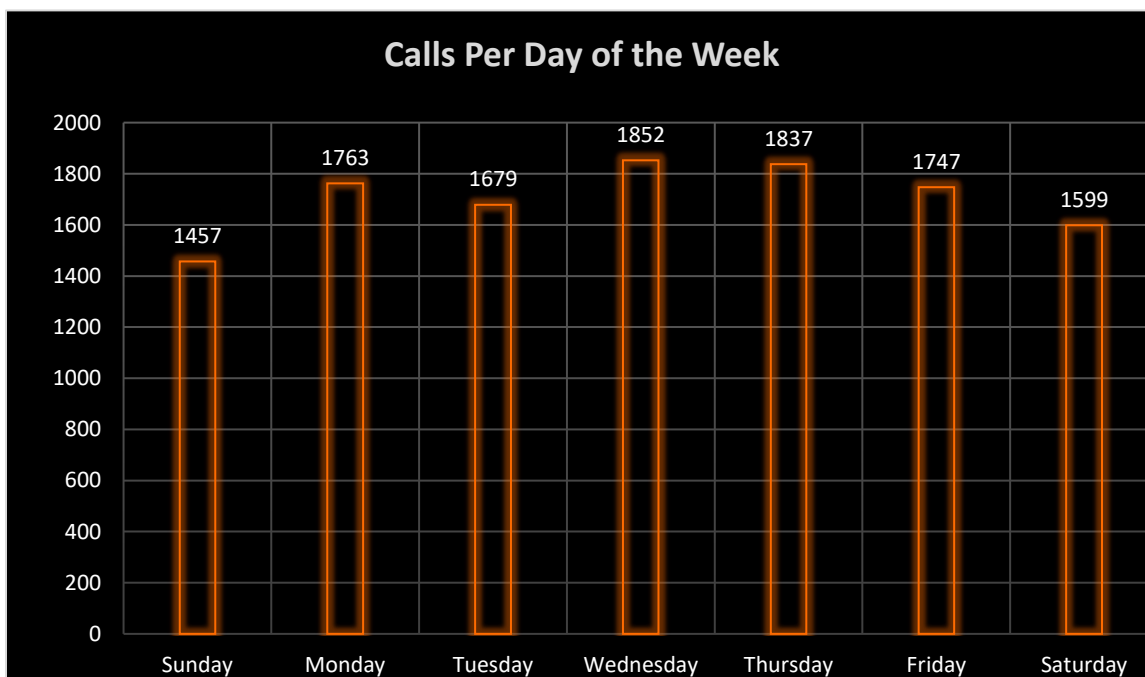

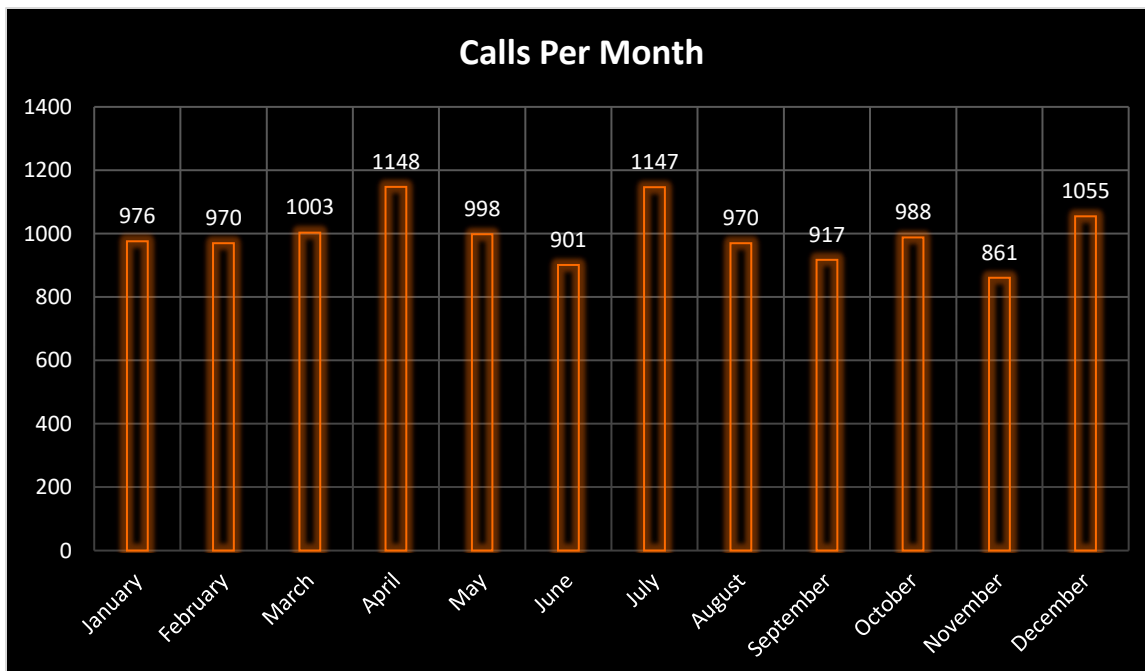
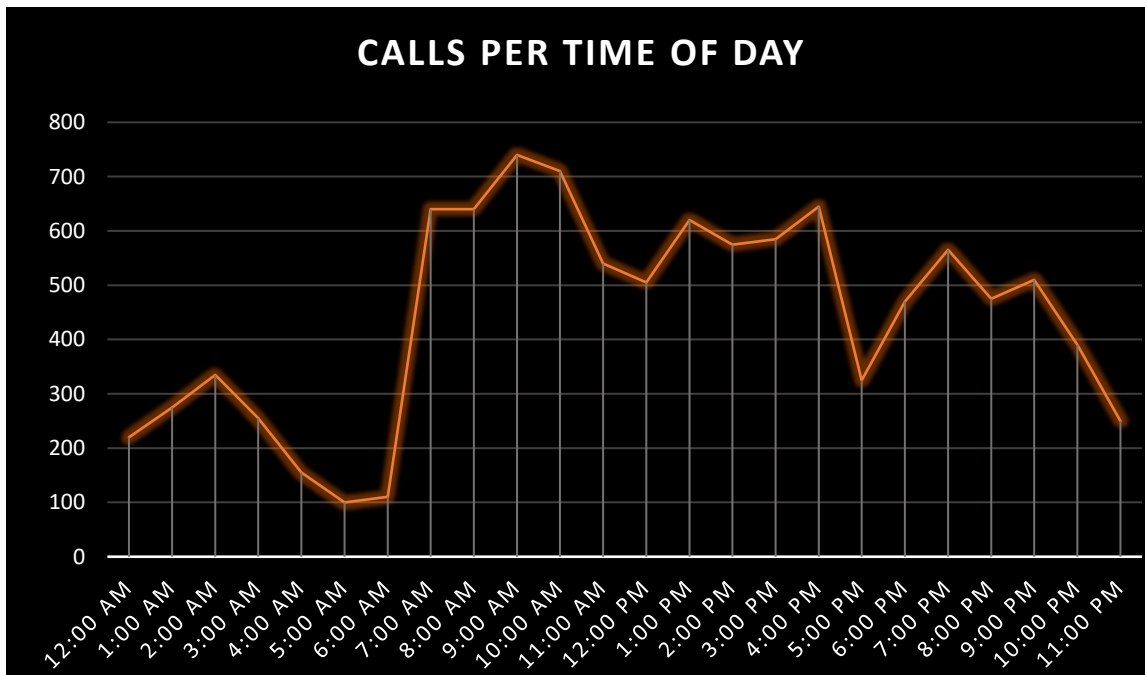

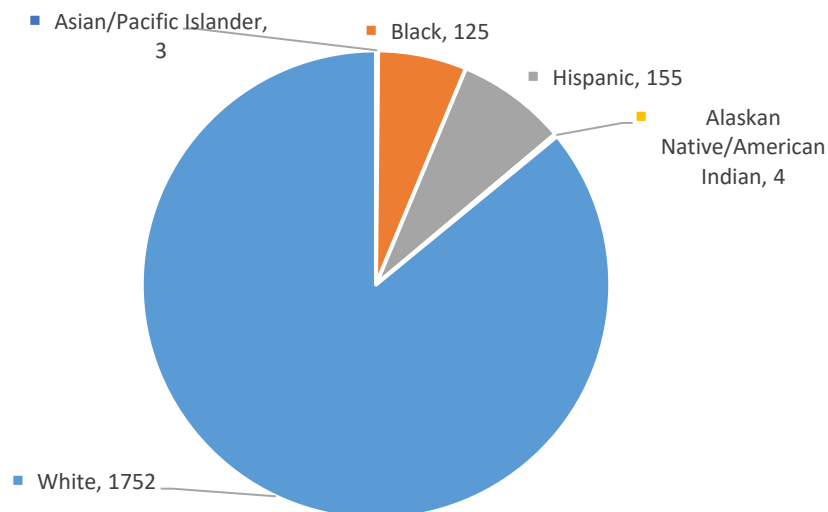
Distance covered by police units: 98,490



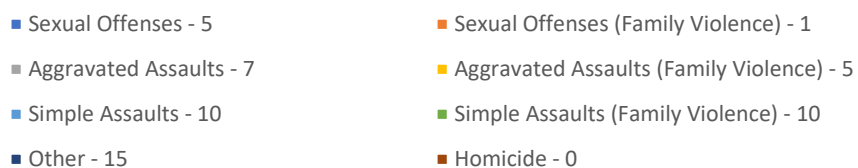




Traffic Stops by Race

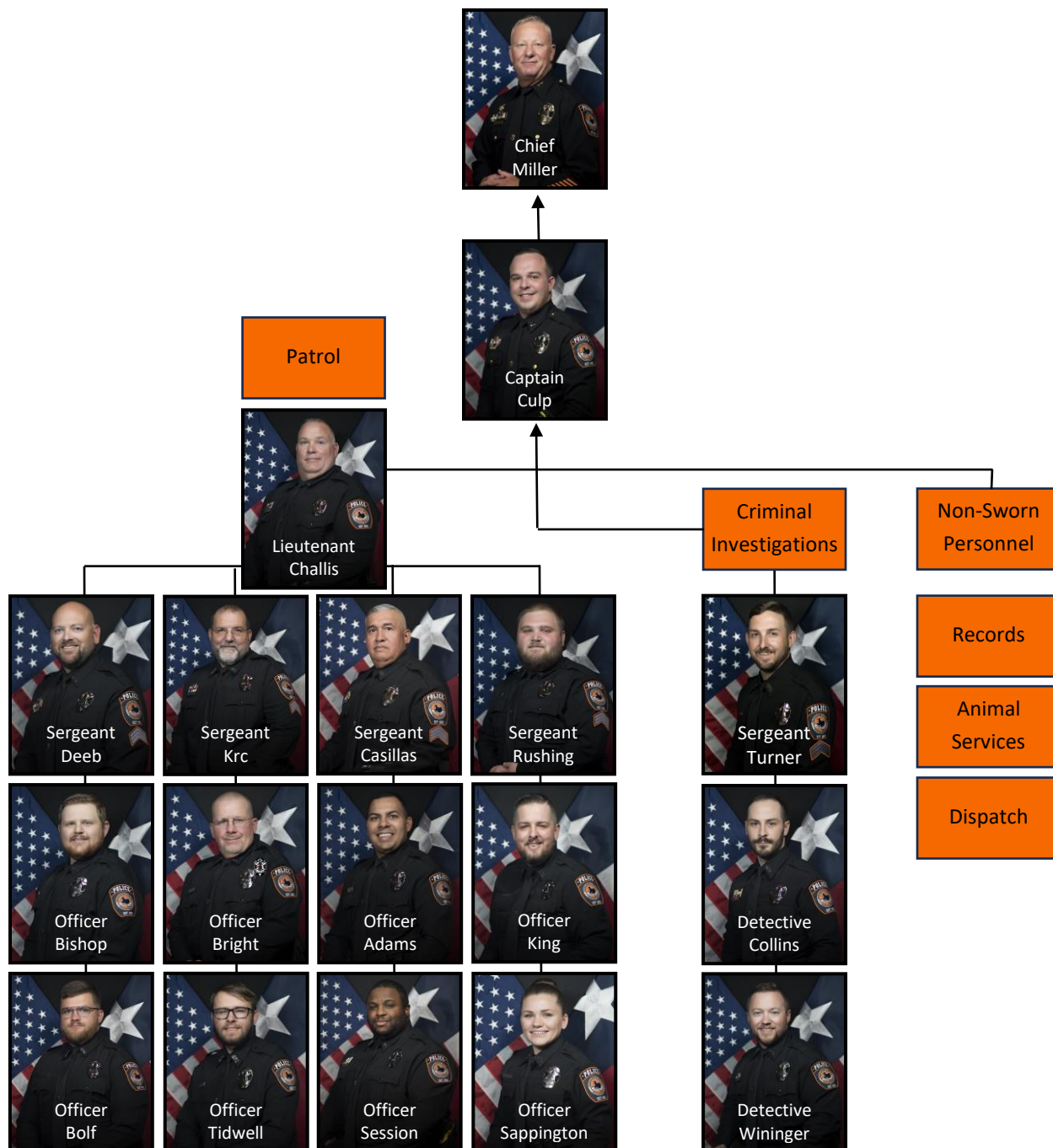


Crimes Against Persons

Patrol Division



The face of the Burkburnett Police Department exists in the patrol division. These are the men and women out in uniform and marked patrol units that you see responding to calls, making traffic stops, and out checking on businesses and the community.

The patrol division is separated into four shifts: two day shifts and two night shifts. One sergeant operates each shift, with officers assigned to them. Officers work 12-hour shifts on a rotating 2-2-3 schedule (Panama Schedule). This allows all patrol officers to have every other Friday, Saturday, and Sunday off.

Our officers are encouraged to interact with the community as often as possible between calls or other pertinent incidents. With that, we encourage you to get to know our officers.





Criminal Investigations Division



Our Criminal Investigations Division (CID) is a hardworking team of well-qualified detectives. The detectives spend their shifts working on ongoing investigations and investigating crimes that have yet to be reported. Their end goal is gathering facts and building cases in an efficient manner to keep criminals off the streets. They work

tirelessly, handling day-to-day operations while also being available 24/7 should their assistance be required.

CID works with a handful of resources from the surrounding areas to complete their mission. This includes, but is not limited to, the Texas Department of Family Services, Texas Rangers and CID, the District Attorney's Office, Patsy's House, and surrounding municipal and county sheriff's offices.





Crime Prevention Unit

Purpose:

The Crime Prevention Unit is a specialized group of experienced officers that focuses their enforcement and prevention efforts on drugs, vice, and other special crimes. Unit members gather intelligence, make arrests, and saturate specifically targeted areas to combat crime. The Crime Prevention Unit aims to reduce crime and improve the quality of life for the citizens of Burkburnett. The unit also executes high-risk search warrants and arrest warrants for the department and outside agencies.

Priorities:

- Identifying and arresting violent subjects
- Locating and arresting subjects who assault or flee from police officers
- Conducting special operations inside the city limits of Burkburnett
- Surveillance missions of suspects who are involved in serial criminal activity
- Street-level gang enforcement
- Street-level drug enforcement
- Quality of life issues
- Educating citizens in crime prevention





Support Services

Dispatch – Our dispatchers work around the clock answering phone calls for emergencies and non-emergencies, dispatching necessary resources and units, and accessing a state and national database to disseminate information.

Records – Our records and evidence clerk maintains the ongoing reports that are developed by officers and CID. The clerks are also responsible for archiving evidence. This is a non-stop job, as crime and evidence never stop.

Animal Services – Our Animal services Office (ASO) are on duty five days a week, but available anytime for emergencies. They are responsible for handling calls for vicious, mistreated, or missing animals.

Needless to say, behind the badge is a team of unseen employees that the Burkburnett Police Department would not function without. We are grateful for their work and dedication.





Traffic Enforcement Devices (TEDS)

The Burkburnett Police Department acquired two Message Center 360 Variable Messaging Signs through a grant issued by NorTex. These Traffic Enforcement Devices (TEDs) are capable of showing text-based messages for instructions and cautions, showing vehicle speeds with its equipped radar, and collection of traffic data. Motorcycle Traffic Unit

The Burkburnett Police Department has invested in three BMW RT1250 motorcycles to implement a new unit of traffic enforcement. The motorcycles are outfitted and intended to be used for high traffic areas to ensure safety for our small community. Motorcycles allow for easier access and maneuverability, which will be especially useful during times when the school zones are active or special events that bring higher traffic to the city.

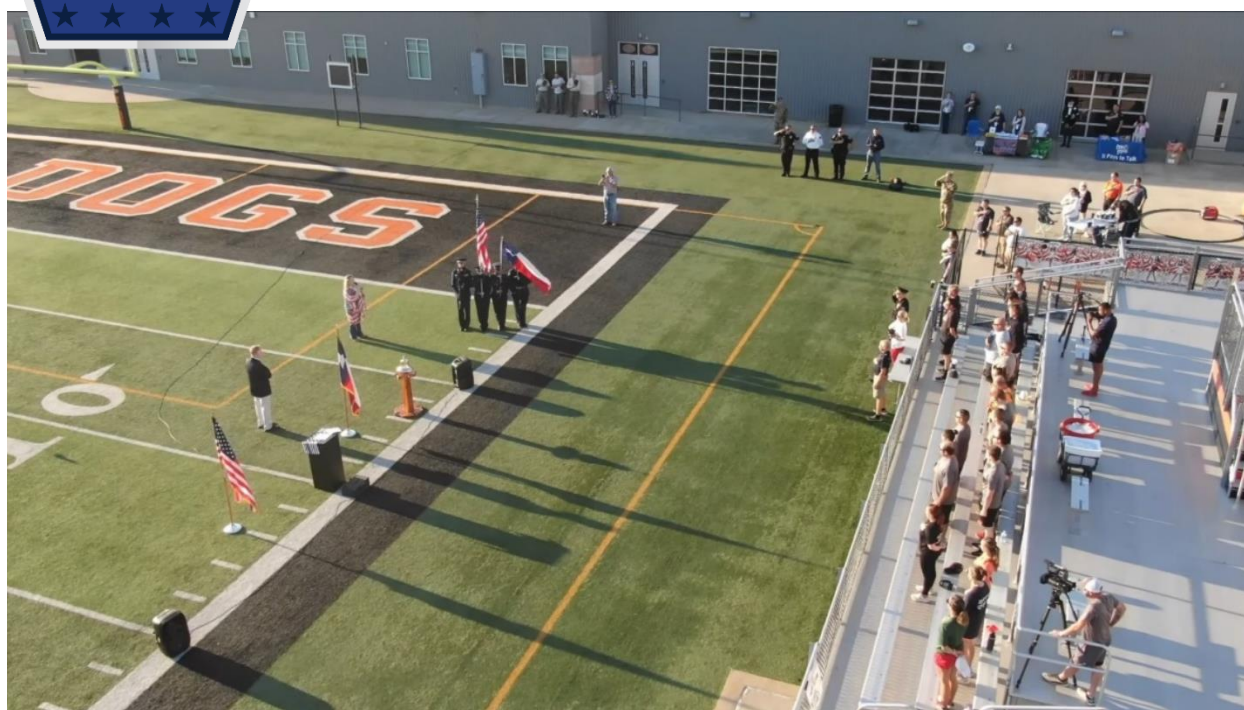

William Irvin Garland

Chief of Police

End of Watch Saturday, May 18, 1935

Age: 64

Tour: 15 years

Chief Garland drowned when a bridge over the Red River, collapsed during a period of heavy flooding.

The chief had noticed that a number of people were on the bridge watching the rising flood waters. As he went onto the bridge to warn them to get off, the bridge was struck by timber from a railroad bridge that had collapsed upstream.

The impact of the timber caused the bridge to collapse. Chief Garland and six citizens were thrown into the river and drowned as a result.

Chief Garland had served with the agency for 15 years. He was survived by his wife and eight children.
